Well, the month of December certainly had its hits and misses, ups and downs! We started with Advent with a wonderful service as we anticipated the arrival and involvement of Stephen and Juli Bounds and their daughters. The second Sunday of Advent, however, presented a far different picture. Upon arrival at the church I was greeted with Carl Fritche's car stuck in the church driveway, which had not been plowed despite the personal arrangement made by Elder Steven Buckley and reported to me the evening before. As a result, we were forced to cancel the entire service. From excitement and enthusiastic about celebrating Advent and welcoming Stephen, I drove home disappointed. I must say the Deacons did an excellent job calling the people on their lists to relay the news of our cancellation.

It was going to be critical that all of us that support the work of Hope Church contribute twice the amount of income on Sunday December 14th to make up for the snowed out week. Well to those who believe God provides. The offering for the 14th of December was about twice of a single week. What a great congregation in being so faithful a steward of what God has given all of us.

As you read the news letter you will have experienced three Sunday morning worship services and Christmas Eve services with new instrumentation, new arrangement of the chancel, new volume, and new music. This is where the rubber meets the road regarding the changes that were discussed and affirmed at the Ocean Grove Leaders Retreat. What were once concepts are now realities. I urge you now, as I did then, to talk to Stephen, Gwynne and me about the new worship style. We will make this a positive transition that will take several months and a lot of modifying along the way. If we can all demonstrate patience with the process and patience and honesty with each other we will all be the better for the journey together. Thanks for being such wonderful, willing, open sisters and brothers in Christ. I love being at Hope, and I love working with you. May the love of the Lord, our Emmanuel, truly be with each of you this Christmas season and throughout the coming year.

WHAT DID JESUS DO? - JESUS CAME INTO THE NEIGHBORHOOD!

The Gospel of John, chapter one talks about how, "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us." Another popular paraphrase of this section says, "Jesus came into the neighborhood." The concept is that Jesus came and lived among us and was relevant to his surroundings. Every sermon he preached, every parable he told, every example he used, was something that the people around him were very familiar with. Often times he just showed them things with God's eye view (an aspect they had forgotten about).

Many of you are probably wondering who I am and why I am here at Hope. Well, in a nutshell my mission is to make the church relevant to its surroundings just like Jesus was and is relevant to every aspect of life.

How do we do that? There are three questions we must ask ourselves:

- What is the purpose of Hope Presbyterian Church?
- Who do we want to reach for Christ (In what neighborhood has God planted this church)?
- Are we willing to do what it takes to reach them?

Already Juli and I have been surveying the area and speaking to unbelievers about what styles of music they are in to. Music is what touches the soul and inspires the heart. Music is the one universal language. Certain styles of music put us in certain moods. Emotions are evoked by certain songs.

If we want to be relevant to our surroundings and society then we must offer them a style that will attract them and draw them into the presence of God.

My goal is to see Hope Presbyterian Church burst at the seams with people wanting to get to know and experience God in a way that will change their lives and lifestyles radically. I ask that you come along willingly on this adventure of God's grace and that you open your hearts to what God has for this body of believers.

NEW EQUIPMENT COMING!

At the December 16th meeting of the session Stephen Bounds made a presentation as to what types of new electronic equipment the church needed if we wanted to be relevant to our surroundings, the community at large, and our society so we could offer a style of worship that would be attractive and draw them into the presence of God. In order to have the best contemporary style worship service that combines the elements of our traditional reformed worship and the emerging praise style of worship into what is know as a blended style of worship service the session approved the purchase of about \$4,000.00 in new equipment. We will spend about \$1,500.00 on sound equipment and about \$2,500.00 on visual equipment. Items to be purchased include 12 channel mixer, amplifier, equalizer, compressor, cabling, microphones, LCD projector, motorized screen, computer, software and a DVD player. Funding sources are now being determined so stay tuned.

NOTES FROM GWYNNE MAHNS WORK

Gwynne said at the end of her November report to the session, "As someone in the choir said, the dynamics are going to be interesting: Stephen is coming as a consultant to teach and train worship leaders – including me- here at Hope. They're all eager to see how this is going to work out in practice. Me too!" As she will tell you it's been a little over three weeks and things will be fine if she can find enough time to get in all the extra practice required.

Gwynne has had many rehearsals and meetings with Stephen as he teaches and trains everyone involved in worship including our choir in new Praise songs and liturgy that will be used in our blended worship services. She has added more songs to the worship service bulletin and eventually we will have the words projected on our new projection equipment.

145 copies of the Advent Reflection Booklets were printed by Gwynne. All the families who come to Parents Night Out received copies along with an invitation to attend our Christmas Eve Services.

Gwynne noted that Carl and the Bell Choir had worked very hard on Christmas music. Carl is also providing private lessons right now to one aspiring hand bell ringer. Carl has told Gwynne that he is very pleased with all the ringer's progress and commitment.

As Gwynne said from now on you're going to see more people involved in instrumental music. As an example on Sunday the 14th of December we had hand bells, keyboard, flute, guitar, singers and drums.

Gwynne said this is going to take a lot of rehearsal and musical arranging hours, but she is sure the effort will be God-honoring and worthwhile.

WORSHIP AIDE POSITIONS AVAILABLE

Your church could use your help in the various worship aides positions. If you are looking for a way to "ease into service", there are a few positions that you could fill with little or no experience. If you are not yet a member, these positions are still open to you. This could be just the thing to help you put names to faces you see each week. You will never be alone in any situation. Someone will always be there to guide you and answer questions. Best of all is that you can start by being a substitute serving only when we are in need. Here are some of the areas of need:

Usher: An usher greets worshippers at the door and hands them a bulletin. During the time of offering, an usher will pass the plate to those sitting in the pews. Ushers also hand out the friendship pads during the passing of the peace and collect them after the service is completed. On a communion Sunday, they will collect and dispose of the communion cups after service. They serve 2 weeks in a row in rotation.

Nursery: Nursery people care for our youngest members in the John Calvin room while their parents worship. We do not have little ones in the nursery very often but we schedule someone every week just in case. If there are no children, the nursery person worships as usual. An usher will summon you, if needed, during service. They serve 1 Sunday in a rotation.

Sexton: Sextons are a very vital part of service to the church. They clean our church before service on Sunday. This can be done on Friday or Saturday depending upon your schedule and the schedule of Parent's Night Out. There are detailed instructions available to aid you in what is necessary to be done. Normally, there are two (2) people cleaning as a team. If you want to help in this area and do not have a team partner, we will find someone to team up with you. They serve 1 week in rotation.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Church School will once again sponsor the Souper Bowl of caring collection on Sunday February 1st, 2004 The offering collected will be donated to a hunger program in our immediate area.

It is the intention of the CE committee that early next year they will set up a task force to plan for a Jr. & Sr. High youth program. It is their intention to put together a program outline so we will be ready to start the program by next fall.

Pancake Breakfast: On Fat Sunday February 22 the Sunday School will once again be sponsoring a pancake breakfast to celebrate the start of Lent. I have it on good authority that Rev. Cotton will be asked to be the head chief again. Be ready for a great time of fellowship and good food to eat. It was great last year.

STEWARDSHIP

If you're making donations to both the General Fund and the Building Fund, or any designated giving please write separate checks. Our Treasurer Marilyn Gifford is not able to divide one check between two or more bank accounts.

Boxes of envelopes for making contributions in 2004 were available for pickup starting Sunday December 28th in the lobby of the church. If there wasn't a box left there with your name on it and you would like envelopes please contact Marilyn Gifford. For those of you with the old blue building fund envelopes we only ask that you throw them out and start using the new ones.

It's never too late; you can still turn in a stewardship commitment card by mailing it or bringing the card to church and place it in the morning worship offering plates. Please take care to understand that the regular card is a commitment only to the regular church operating fund. If you also wish to **start or to continue** a commitment to the building fund you must hand write the words building fund and the monthly amount you wish to contribute to that fund. If you misplaced your card extras are available at the visitors' center in the lobby with the added wording already on them.
