# The Power of a Simple Gift

For the second year our congregation is participating in Operation Christmas Child, part of Franklin Graham's Samaritan's Purse mission network. Last year we joined with over 7 million donors to provide shoe boxes filled with age appropriate items for girls and boys living in critical circumstances around the world. Dolls, stuffed animals, hard candy, soap, toothpaste, cars, and rubber balls were our ways of sharing and reaching out in the name of Jesus Christ. Some families included pictures, prayers, or personal notes. The Crutchley family even received a letter back from the minister who distributed their shoe box.

Children are offered Gospel storybooks in their own languages and invited to learn more about Jesus through a follow-up discipleship program. The Good News reaches a child, a family, a village.

Please join with us this November 19 when we dedicate each "mission in a box" during the worship service. Remember in your prayers the children and families who receive the boxes, the workers who pack them for shipment, and those who deliver them across the world.

# **OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD 2006**

Use a regular sized shoebox or a plastic box of the same size. If you wrap the shoebox, the lid and bottom must be wrapped separately.

Put a rubber band around the box and bring it to church by Nov. 19.
