Wow! What a weekend we had.

I have to confess that going into the session retreat I didn't know what to expect... after all, it was the first time I had led a session retreat, and the first time we had done something like this. I knew that some of the elders were feeling a little wary as well. Early on we had asked the question do we really even need to spend the night somewhere. But I knew that we needed to get away and just be together for an extended period of time. More can happen relationally in a weekend like this, then can happen in 6 months of session meetings. And I have to say that this really was true for us.

Sure, we accomplished quite a bit. Friday night we spent time building relationships, worshiping together and studying the bible, sharing some of our stories with each other in small groups, and praying together. Saturday morning we talked about the expectations involved in being a elder, and our philosophy of what ministry should look like. And in the afternoon we spent the bulk of our time forming a vision for this next year.

But I have to say that the most exciting stuff happened relationally, in the down times; while brewing coffee for breakfast, in conversations over snacks or lunch, in spontaneous walks around the neighborhood. It was the experience of growing closer to one another, sharing and spending time with each other, that truly made the retreat worthwhile. As a result, we left the weekend with a greater sense that we were a team, and with a renewed sense of purpose going forward. That is what was exciting for me.

Now, again, I have to confess that it is not all sugar and spice. As a session we are very aware that Hope Church has some challenges ahead (especially with Gwynne leaving, and our financial situation). And we believe that he has been faithful in guiding us up until this point... and will remain faithful to us throughout this next season together. Retreat Reflections from the Christian Education Committee

Glancing around the table at our January 16 Session Meeting, it occurred to me that I actually wanted to go away and brainstorm, pray, and worship with this group of folks who I knew were committed to ministry in the name of Jesus Christ. Our retreat did indeed offer a pivotal opportunity to learn more about Andrew's vision for Hope Presbyterian Church, to refocus as a Session on what our priorities should be, and to get to know Michelle and Ceil, our new elders, even better. In addition, through Bible Study, we each had the opportunity to look within ourselves, assessing our own attitudes and behaviors in preparation for leadership.

The word that most encapsulates my experience in Ocean Grove is STEWARDSHIP, in the most profound sense of the word. How can we be the wisest stewards of our resources: the time, talent, and treasure of our congregation... to spread the Good News not only locally, but globally? How can we make the best use of our church building and property for ministry now and in the future? Do we glorify God in the choices we are making?

As chairperson of the Christian Education Committee, overseeing children's, youth, and adult education, one of my priorities will be the happy task of preparing for an additional church school class in the fall, to determine where the class will meet and who will teach it. Our Youth Group needs to be reactivated, and a Task Force will be organized shortly to suggest activities and determine a leadership structure. In terms of Adult Education, we would like to once again offer more Bible Studies, perhaps of 6 - 8 weeks duration, with babysitting where possible. To effect these changes, input and help would be welcomed from the congregation, so that we can implement programs that would benefit all of us, from toddlers through senior citizens, on our faith journeys.

What happens in my life after May 27 is totally in God's hands – but I can't help hoping that an initial rest period will be part of that plan!

Retreat Overview and Pages from the Clerk's Notes

Perhaps the most exciting part of the retreat for the elders was the brainstorming and prayer that took place in the afternoon. Initially the sessions was asked to review the mission statement of the church (what we call the 5 I's) to discern if they are still relevant to where we are at. While maintaining the basic formula, we ended up changing some of the specific language... **INTRODUCE** people to the enduring love of God found in the Gospel of Jesus Christ **INVITE** them to become part of the family of God **INSTRUCT** them in the scriptures, God's word to us **INVOLVE** them in the ministry of the church, according to their gifts **INSPIRE** them to go into the world, making disciples of others.

We urge you to memorize and use the 5 I's of our Mission Statement. The rational is to bring people full circle through a process that will then prepare them to introduce others to God's love.

Then what followed was a brainstorming session that looked at some future issues that we may have to address as a church. Among the issues discussed were...

At this point, following a break, we gathered together in prayer and journaling. During this time we focused on asking God to guide us in discerning what we as a congregation were being called to focus on in the upcoming year. As each of us began sharing what we felt God was calling us to, it quickly became apparent that the dominant focus was becoming the theme of Stewardship. In fact, almost every single one of us shared something that was related to that theme. This was truly an exciting moment... to see how God could speak so clearly to the group through each of its individuals. What is more, God even guided our discussion to a passage from scripture, which has become our inspiration for this coming year in ministry. *Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others, faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms.* (1 Peter 4:10)

With Stewardship as our ministry focus for this year, everyone was asked to come up with one or two ways in which they could emphasize stewardship in their perspective ministries. The following goals were listed:

Stewardship of our property by its upkeep and its expansion

Worship - more congregational involvement in the worship service

Mission - visible public presence - Soup Kitchens

Stewardship / Finance - budget, "Mortgage", Investment Management, Fundraising

Clerk - mentoring an assistant clerk from a younger church member

Property - Facility Use; manse usage, perhaps the basement

Personnel - Gwynne's leaving

Pastor Andrew - Stewardship sermon series

Christian Education - Expansion of Adult Bible Study

Membership - New Membership Classes; Stewardship presented in the class using the 3 T's (time, treasure, talents) so people can serve

Nominating - list expectations to potential new Leaders

It is the hope of the leadership that God would grow the congregation in its understanding of Stewardship in this upcoming year.
