STEWARDSHIP OF TIME

Perhaps the most important aspect of Stewardship, especially in today's world, is the proper management of the gift of time.

Time is more fleeting than any talent and more precious than any treasure. It is ironic to think that technology has created many time-saving devices and yet we seem to have less and less time.

Calendars seem to fill without us even being aware of whether we are making the best use of our time. God gives us 24 hours each day - how much of that time do we spend with Him and with one another.

Disciples in Prayer

The practice of stewardship has the power to change how we understand our lives. Christian stewards recognize God as the origin of life, giver of freedom, and the source of all we have and are. Christian stewards also know the power of prayer.

Communicating with God

Prayer has always been the cornerstone of the Christian experience. As we embark on our pariah Stewardship journey we must realize that all good things come from God and we are what we are because of Him.

While individual prayer is the simplest form of praise to the Lord, Stewardship of Time asks for a commitment of allotting time for prayer.

The intimacy of prayer must be captured at a dedicated, quiet time during the day. Just as we would make any other appointment, make an appointment with the Lord to pray. How we pray is a personal choice with many variations. Our commitment to the Stewardship of Time calls us to daily prayer and spiritual exercises to strengthen our relationship with Jesus and one another.

Ample Time for Rest and Recreation

Bruce C. Birch, author of "The Steward Living in Covenant" states, 'How we use and manage God's gifts affects far more than our economic life. We are stewards in our use of God's creation, in our personal relationships, in our political and ecclesial institutions, in our work, and in our use of time. Indeed we are stewards of the gospel itself – the good news entrusted to all of us in the church'.

This month, think about how you use your time. This month ask yourself: Where do I see that an allotment of my time can make a difference? Pledge with God that you will make a bigger difference in the use if this time out of gratitude for all He has done for you. The question is never really "Do I have time?" but "What do I have time for?"

"Moment of Stewardship from 8/24/08 by Becky Harris-Flynn"

I consider myself lucky to be a member of a very special club here at Hope. Other members include my sister Rachel, Daniel Buckley, and his sister Elizabeth. I'll call this club "Former Hope Church Youth" - members that have spent their entire lives here at Hope. We are members that were born of members, baptized here, and attended Sunday school taught by some of the people still teaching today. We are alumni of Junior Choir, Thenka Theou and Chi Rho, the old youth groups that used to meet Thursdays and Sundays.

When I think back now on my childhood, my memories always center around my church family. I spent a lot more time at school with the friends I made there, but the images that first some to mind are of Johnsonburg retreats, Sunday nights with Chi Rho at the old Friendly's in Shrewsbury, "Capture the Flag" in the front yard of Sue Mahns, Colby musicals at the church in Long Branch, and the Creek bank musicals under the direction of Beverly Allender.

As I grew older, there was never a question of "if" but "how" I would choose to get in volved. I am, after all, the daughter of David and Mary Harris, and I believe you would be hard-pressed to find many people who have given more of their time, treasure or talents over the years than my parents. Growing up with them and watching them act as Clerks of Session, Deacons, Gleaners, Elders, Choir Members; I knew that my time and talents were equally as important as financial contributions. When we had the Stewardship Fair last year, I felt drawn to the youth programs here at Hope. Being a former Hope Youth and treasuring that experience, I wanted to share those memories and help indoctrinate new kids into our special group.

I have found only one potential pitfall to being a member of this club. We had such amazing teachers who gave us such a strong spiritual foundation, that if we weren't careful, it was easy to think that we had learned it all already. When you have been lucky enough to have grown up with Jesus in your home, it can be easy to be lazy about your faith. Your faith has always been there. It's easy to take for granted. Sometimes I see new Christians and I envy the vigor with which they almost attack their faith. That enthusiasm sometimes seems to be a trait mostly reserved for born again Christians.

I began teaching Sunday school last year. For each Sunday that I was teaching, I would spend the preceding week researching the lesson. I would first get down my old Bible off the shelf; the one Reverend Al had given me on my confirmation, to read the scriptures we would be learning about. Next I would hit the Internet to read as many interpretations of the scripture as I could find. Sometimes I would turn to my parents for proper pronunciations. I found myself discussing the stories at home to look for new insights. I had heard these stories a hundred times before, but what did they mean? What were we to take away from it? How was this applicable to the lives of our kids? I ran to the Bible store to get a new study Bible after realizing that I needed more information. While I was there, I would pick up a few more books for background reading. If I was going to teach something, I had to really know what I was talking about.

Invariably the kids would ask me questions for which I hadn't prepared. These were usually the type of "why does God let bad things happen to good people" questions that we as Christians struggle with and theologians may still debate, and they would leave me running to Kathy and Andrew for back-up. I would leave lessons with questions of my own that would have me thinking about faith all week, running back to my Bible and to the Internet to search for answers. The more information I found, the more time I spent thinking about how this all related to not only my students, but to how I should be living my own life.

One day, it hit me. In preparing myself to teach these kids, I was working on my OWN faith! I was growing. I was learning. I was listening to God a lot more closely. I hadn't done that in a really long time. These were the same stories, the same lessons I had learned repeatedly throughout my entire life. I thought I knew them inside and out. It never occurred to me that I was going to get anything more out of them.

I remember Reverend Al telling me that I had a very strong relationship with God for a child, but that was just a foundation. As I moved to adulthood, I needed to develop a more mature relationship with him. Well anyone that knows me can tell you that I hate being told I doing something the wrong way. I knew all the Bible stories. What else did he think I had to learn?

How right he was. There is a certain irony that in attempting to bring the scriptures to the youth of Hope, my adult relationship with God has finally deepened. God has a funny way of getting you to where you need to be, usually without you even realizing you been traveling until you're already on your way. Sometimes in preparation for the next day's lesson, I would spend an entire Saturday reading the Bible and thinking about what it meant to live the scriptures the way God intended. What else could have caused me to have personal intensive Bible studies in my own home?

Nothing has renewed my vigor and my faith the way this Stewardship of my time has. I have had so much fun the past year not only with Sunday school, but with the pageant. Kathy has a lot of really great ideas for this coming year and I am excited to be part of it again.

When I was in college, I interned for some pretty big and impressive companies like IBM and MTV. However when I graduated, I made the decision to turn down the higher salary, 401Ks and larger pensions to work for a very small production company. There were quite a few reasons. I didn't want to get pigeon-holed into just doing one task; I wanted to learn a little bit everything. A small company has an organic fluidity that enables you to jump in and learn by doing. At IBM, I had to choose to be a graphic designer OR a programmer OR a project manager. At my small company, I was all three plus a writer, a director, a salesman, an accountant, and an HR rep. There were only six of us at this company so we did everything from the loftiest tasks to the lowest. I would meet with CEOs and then come back to clean the bathroom. Another reason I choose to work at a small company was to avoid starting on the bottom rung of the ladder and having to work my way up over decades; I wanted to jump right in a have a say in the direction of the company. I found that small companies foster a family environment unlike any large corporation. I loved it and I have been working for small companies ever since.

I think Hope Church is a lot like that. We are a small company with a small work force, but we have the same agendas as the "Joel Olsteen-sized" companies. In order to make it happen, we are even more in need of talented people. We have so much more opportunity for growth than larger churches. We can choose to get involved in almost any way we want. We may not be as flashy or impressive, but because we are small, each one of us is so much more vitally important to our family. Each of us has a greater responsibility. None of us can get lost in the crowd. I think that is really exciting! God has given each of us gifts. It's the diversity of these gifts complementing one another that allows us to work as many members of one body and allows such a small congregation to accomplish so much.

In closing, I just want to thank the Lord and this congregation for not only allowing me, but also for inspiring me to become part of your youth ministries. God Bless!
