Biblical Stewardship: The Truth About Money

Biblical stewardship requires that a Christian view money differently from the way the secular world views it. The secular world equates affluence with success and happiness. Therefore, society constantly struggles to acquire as much wealth as possible. The Bible, however, exposes the worthlessness of such a struggle by revealing the truth about money. The Psalms proclaim, "But man, despite his riches, does not endure; he is like the beasts that perish" (Psalm 49:12). No matter how much one struggles for wealth, death still awaits because money cannot add anything to one's life.

One could argue that, although money does not keep death away, it is still worth pursuing because it brings happiness and satisfaction in life. Solomon, a wise and rich man, argues, "Whoever loves money never has money enough; whoever loves wealth is never satisfied with his income. This too is meaningless. As goods increase, so do those who consume them. And what benefit are they to the owner except to feast his eyes on them...the abundance of a rich man permits him no sleep" (Ecclesiastes 5:10-12). Money is meaningless. It can never satisfy those who love it and, instead, offers frivolous goods and anxiety. The struggle for wealth brings with it dissatisfaction, not a better life.

Biblical stewardship does not require that a Christian despise money or to discontinue earning it. Money is a necessity for basic living. The Bible does warn, however, that the love of money creates evil (1 Timothy 6:10). It is important not to allow money to become the center of one's life. When money is not the object of one's love and devotion, one is free to focus on higher things.

Good stewardship encourages a Christian to find true value in life. If money does not offer much to life, what does? The Bible states, "Whoever trusts in his riches will fall, but the righteous will thrive like a green leaf" (Proverbs 11:28). The righteous, not the rich, thrive. But how do the righteous thrive without riches? They thrive because they understand and possess what holds a higher value.

The righteous have character. Proverbs 22:1 states, "A good name is more desirable than great riches; to be esteemed is better than silver or gold." A pure reputation should be one's goal in life rather than the accumulation of wealth. Character lasts. Money cannot.

Believing in God offers the righteous a lifetime of wealth (Romans 11:33). Knowing God and understanding his love are the true eternal riches. The author of Hebrews writes, "Keep your lives free from the love of money and be content with what you have, because God has said, 'Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you' (Hebrews 13:5). Money does not love and it does not linger. It is God who stands by and blesses his children in immeasurable amounts-this promise, not money, truly satisfies. Swan on a Lake

The summer had left us and we had just started the first week of fall when I decided to vary my walking route around the neighborhood and try a different route. I selected Franklin Lake in West Long Branch, just a few minutes from home with a nice mile trail around the lake. There were a few leaves starting to turn color. This was going to be a potentially good walk.

I had shied from this spot for a while because it reminded me of my sister-in-law, Diane's and my visit the summer before, while she was in her battle with cancer, and it saddened me to think of her death. She and I made our way to the gazebo that day with small steps and heavy breathing because Diane had to struggle with walking. I knew how much Di loved God's creations and I had told her of all of the beautiful birds there, including this magnificent swan. We chatted and watched and enjoyed all of the birds and the scenery and each other's company, but the swan never appeared and she was so disappointed. I reassured her and promised that for real there was a swan, I saw it myself many times, but on that particular day the two of us could not find it. I told her we would come another day and find it. We never had the opportunity after that to return to the lake together and find the swan.

Diane was on my mind as I walked past Shore Regional and the thick growth of lakeside greenery, which blocked my view of the lake in that area. As I left Shore Regional property and was again in the residential area, the overgrowth thinned and I had a perfect view of the lake, the gazebo on the opposite shore, and the magnificent swan, floating on the lake not 50 feet from me!!! This sighting of the swan was breathtaking and very emotional for me. I stopped in my tracks, eyes frozen on this beautiful creation, and, with tears streaming down my face I thought, "Here he is Di. I told you he was here." The bird stretched its neck upward, pointed its beak to the sky, fluffed its huge wings for a moment and then returned to its statuesque beauty, floating on the lake. I felt the Lord's presence that day, like a jolt of electricity. What was the message he was sending me?

The next day, I was fortunate to spend the afternoon with my young friend, Chad, who is recovering from two bouts with brain cancer. This is a beautiful spirited young man who, when he sneezes and you say, "God bless you", he says, "Thank you and God bless you too." We attended a QiGong class at the Wellness Community and took a walk at 80 Acres. While resting at my home, Chad sat at my piano and started to play a simple, beautiful song. He had played a few measures on previous visits, but he had never done more than that, due to possibly not remembering it, losing interest in it, or losing the energy to do it. On this day, Chad played the whole song for me from memory. I was so impressed I asked him if he had been practicing and he said, yes, a little. I asked him to show me how to play it and he started at the beginning and showed me the fingering. We hummed the melody together; it was beautiful. I congratulated him and pointed out that this was a milestone. He was progressing because he had not been able to do that previously. With his usual kindness, he thanked me. I asked him the name of the song and he said, "Swan on a Lake."

Thank you, heavenly Father, for showing your love for us in so many different ways. We pray that we can keep our hearts open so we can hear you. Help us to know you are always there.

The Pentecost Offering is traditionally received on the day of Pentecost (May 31, 2009). It provides a direct way to meet the needs of children at risk, youth, and young adults. Congregations are encouraged to keep 40 percent of the Offering to support ministry with children at risk in their communities. The General Assembly's portion (60 percent) provides leadership development opportunities for Presbyterian youth and young adults and supports children-at-risk programs at the national level. Since 1998, Presbyterians of all ages have raised over \$7 million for these ministries that benefit younger members of God's family. In the past some of you may recall that Andrew, Daniel, Elisabeth and Jean Buckley attended the Presbyterian Youth Triennium at Purdue U. This is an example of leadership development opportunities for youth. We hope to have some of our present youth at Hope consider attending the next Triennium in 2010 at Purdue. We are thankful for the dedicated church school teaching staff at Hope. We are never surprised at the creativity that use to bring the message of Jesus Christ to our children and youth. We are following a great tradition of church school leadership who have served faithfully over the years!
