## Message from the Pastor

#### THE CONFESSION OF 1967.1.

I have been walking the session through some themes in our *Book of Confessions*. In June we began to look at the Confession of 1967. This document came out when I was 12 years old, and its ideas and language have shaped my own theology every since. Deeply influenced by the theology of 20<sup>th</sup> century Swiss theologian, Karl Barth, the Confession of 1967 remains amazingly current, continuing to speak to issues resonant in our day. The Confession is framed according to Paul's Trinitarian blessing in 2 Corinthians 13:13, with Jesus first, then God, and the Holy Spirit. Thus, in placing Jesus Christ first, it communicates how he sets the tone and determines the direction of Christian theology. This is the first part of the Confession, dealing with Jesus and sin. The words of the Confession are in bold (I have altered the text to make it more inclusive). My brief comments are in italics.

#### JESUS CHRIST.

#### In Jesus of Nazareth, true humanity was realized once for all.

It is important to note that Jesus is "truly human." He shows us what God intends for humanity. The sinful manifestation of humanity we know is not "true humanity," but a distorted, disfigured, and defiled humanity. In creation, humanity was originally blessed and good. Jesus Christ reveals that goodness of who we truly are in God's eyes.

Jesus, a Palestinian Jew, lived among his own people and shared their needs, temptations, joys, and sorrows. He expressed the love of God in word and deed and became a brother to all kinds of sinners. But his complete obedience led him into conflict with his people. His life and teaching judged their goodness, religious aspirations, and national hopes. Many rejected him and demanded his death. In giving himself freely for them, he took upon himself the judgment under which all stand convicted. God raised him from the dead, vindicating him as Messiah and Lord. The victim of sin became victor, and won the victory over sin and death for all.

(It is interesting that the confession refers to Jesus as a "Palestinian Jew," thus inhabiting both ends of today's Middle East conflict. It was written prior to the war in which Israel gained possession of the West Bank.)

Jesus' true humanity came instantly into conflict with the debased humanity of his time and all times. The three areas of conflict are "goodness," (that is, their understanding of what is good, including how this is worked out in morality) religious aspirations, and national hopes. These three things – morality, religion, and nationalism – that stabilize and order society are the three areas in which Jesus most directly challenged the powers of his day.

It is important to note that he gave himself freely and took upon himself the judgment that is the consequence of people not living up to his or their own true humanity. The authorities did not kill him on their own; he allowed it. It was, like the Exodus, God's work; the authorities, like Pharaoh, receive no credit for participating in the sacrifice.

God's reconciling act in Jesus Christ is a mystery which the Scriptures describe in various ways. It is called the sacrifice of a lamb, a shepherd's life given for his sheep, atonement by a priest; again it is ransom of a slave, payment of debt, vicarious satisfaction of a legal penalty, and victory over the powers of evil. These are expressions of a truth which remains beyond the reach of all theory in the depths of God's love for humanity. They reveal the gravity, cost, and sure achievement of God's reconciling work.

This important paragraph frees the church from having to work with only one "theory" of the Atonement, the theological doctrine about how God saves us in Jesus. Though it is not stated here explicitly, the paragraph allows us to move away from Atonement theories that reduce God to a vindictive monster demanding his Son's blood in order to be appeased, and which also make the resurrection irrelevant. The enemy defeated by Christ is not his Father; it is the "powers of evil" represented by Satan.

The paragraph references the Passover, sacrificial imagery used by Jesus in John, the Day of Atonement liturgy, Jesus' own "ransom" language, and other sources. Ultimately, no single image, analogy, or theory is sufficient to completely describe what God is doing for us in Jesus Christ. These are only aids to our understanding; the real point is to live a life of reconciliation.

The risen Christ is the Savior for all people. Those joined to him by faith are set right with God and commissioned to serve as his reconciling community. Christ is head of this community, the church, which began with the apostles and continues through all generations.

Jesus is not our private deity, only for Christians. He is for everybody. Those who trust in him and follow him are gathered into the reconciling community, the Church. But there is an unavoidable "universalism" in Christian faith: what God does in Christ, like everything else God does, is not limited to one segment of humanity; it concerns the whole creation and all people.

The same Jesus Christ is the judge of all people. His judgment discloses the ultimate seriousness of life and gives promise of God's final victory over the power of sin and death. To receive life from the risen Lord is to have life eternal; to refuse life from him is to choose the death which is separation from God. All who put their trust in Christ face divine judgment without fear, for the judge is their redeemer. The Savior is also the Judge. God's judgment is God's salvation; God's will is that the whole creation be saved, redeemed, liberated, healed. But we may still choose death and violence, thus separating ourselves from God's love. Trusting and obeying God in Christ removes our fear of the God who redeems us.

#### Human Sin.

The reconciling act of God in Jesus Christ exposes human evil as sin in the sight of God. In sin, people claim mastery of their own lives, turn against God and other people, and become exploiters and despoilers of the world. They lose their humanity in futile striving and are left in rebellion, despair, and isolation.

Sin is a loss of true humanity. In claiming selfmastery we invariably fall into forms of alienation and violence, which lead to death and bring about destruction. To live out of synch with God's truth is to languish in falsehood and fall into extinction.

Wise and virtuous figures through the ages have sought the highest good in devotion to freedom, justice, peace, truth, and beauty. Yet all human virtue, when seen in the light of God's love in Jesus Christ, is found to be infected by self-interest and hostility. All people, good and bad alike, are in the wrong before God and helpless without his forgiveness. Thus all fall under God's judgment. No one is more subject to that judgment than the one who assumes guiltlessness before God or moral superiority over others.

Humans are temporal and mortal beings. Everything we do and think is infected by selfinterest and bias. There is no such thing as objectivity. Our perception and consciousness are always limited and tainted. In attempting to do good, we invariably and necessarily do evil. Hence our need for the higher perspective of God's love in Jesus Christ.

God's love never changes. Against all who oppose him, God expresses his love in wrath. In the same love, God took on himself judgment and shameful death in Jesus Christ, to bring people to repentance and new life.

To oppose God is to oppose what is real and true. It is thus to go against the grain of truth, goodness, beauty, and choose instead falsehood, evil, and ugliness. But God's love is infinite and constant, always there for us. If we insist on living in opposition to God's love, God still loves us... but we experience that love as wrath. Christ fulfills God's love in emptying himself and becoming human even to the point of suffering a human death. The Confession reminds us that Jesus is also "truly divine;" he is God-with-us. In Christ, God's life is given. Christ reveals God's true nature as this infinite love poured out for us.
